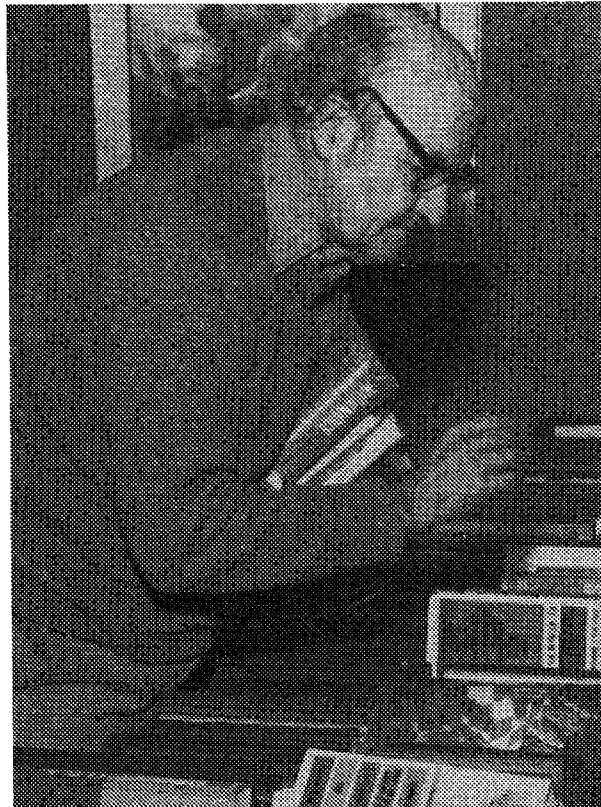
### Special Collections
